

GOSPEL: John 6:1-21

Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. Now the Passover, the festival of the Jews, was near. When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming toward him, Jesus said to Philip, "Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, "Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?" Jesus said, "Make the people sit down."


Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost." So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets.

When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world."

When Jesus realized that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain by himself.

When evening came, his disciples went down to the sea, got into a boat, and started across the sea to Capernaum. It was now dark, and Jesus had not yet come to them. The sea became rough because a strong wind was blowing. When they had rowed about three or four miles, they saw Jesus walking on the sea and coming near the boat, and they were terrified. But he said to them, "It is I; do not be afraid." Then they wanted to take him into the boat, and immediately the boat reached the land toward which they were going.




At your command all things came to be: the vast expanse of interstellar space, galaxies, suns, the planets in their courses, and this fragile earth, our island home.


THE BREAKING OF THE BREAD

50TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE ORDINATION OF THE PHILADELPHIA 11

From The Rt. Rev. Alan M. Gates, Bishop Diocesan and The Rt. Rev. Carol J.W.T. Gallagher, Assistant Bishop:

Dear People of the Diocese of Massachusetts,

On July 29, 1974, at the Church of the Advocate in Philadelphia, 11 women were ordained to the Sacred Order of Priests-the first women to be ordained priests in The Episcopal Church. This summer the church is giving thanks for the 50th anniversary of that historic event.

It may be difficult now for some to imagine our church without the blessing of women serving as priests. It was a singular moment of transformation in our life together in the Body of Christ.

The women, who became known as the "Philadelphia 11," were the Reverends Merrill Bittner, Alla Bozarth-Campbell, Alison Cheek, Emily Hewitt, Carter Heyward, Suzanne Hiatt, Marie Moorefield, Jeannette Piccard, Betty Bone Schiess, Katrina Swanson and Nancy Wittig. They were as varied in background, style and gifts as any 11 people might be, but they shared a determination and faithfulness that gave them the courage to face into the challenges, roadblocks and hostility with which their call was greeted.

The ordination took place on the Feast of Mary and Martha. This pointed, of course, to the fact that women had been among Jesus' earliest and most devoted followers. At another level it highlighted the wholeness which had been missing from the church's priesthood. Mary and Martha individually represent a difference of style and focus too often set up in binary opposition to one another. In fact, it is the completeness created by both together that is their collective gift. Just so, the ordination of women made us more whole.

We call upon the congregations and worshiping communities of our diocese to commemorate the 50th anniversary of women's ordination in The Episcopal Church on Sunday, July 28.

It is so appropriate that The Reverend Patricia Handloss – Pattie's – final service with us at St. Andrew's will be today, Sunday, July 28.

Considering the profound impact of that event 50 years ago, Pattie shared her memories: "Starting in 1970, I worked for the ordination of women with the Rev. Carter Haywood and the late Rev. Susan Hiatt as well as most of the Philadelphia 11. We traveled across the county advocating for the ordination of women called by God to be priests. Those women, my sisters, walked with me on my journey to ordination. Attending their ordination was one of the joys of my life. I was filled with deep gratitude for their bravery and vision."

Last November, Pattie shared with us on the 45th anniversary of her ordination: "The biggest change for me was going from the role as one of the organizers of the movement for women's ordination which is a unique set of tasks, to the role of parish priest. I never wanted to be anything other than a parish priest. I never aspired to the Episcopate or to the academy. It was in the community that I felt my call was to be lived out. . . . The ministry of shepherding is in my soul. Celebrating the Eucharist is deeply settled in my soul. There is nothing more special to me than giving people the Body of Christ—offering them in the tender palm of their hand the body that came to give us life—love for eternity. . . . I remember sitting in evening Chapel early on in my first semester of seminary, looking at the red cross hanging over the altar and thinking in awe, "Here I am. Thank you." And now some 50 years later (5 years from seminary entrance to ordination to the priesthood), once again saying to God, 'Thank you.'"

We will show the movie "The Philadelphia 11" following today's service at the coffee hour/reception. What better way to say "Thank You" to Pattie!

I told her about St Andrew's. She seemed a good fit. Apply, I urged. I believe there are no coincidences. She listened to what the Spirit was calling her to do and be. That was huge and wonderful.

I could not be happier to be hanging up my stole and turning over the parish to Amy. We are friends for which I thank God, and Amy is going to be your new Priest-in-charge for which I also thank God. And I am going to work on a book I have been putting off finishing, and spend some time letting the loss of Cathy become real. My children want me at Linden Pond and I am not adverse to that so I will be in the area in the future. This summer I will spend some time on the beach, sailing and doing some work with the camera and in a dark room. Seeing our children, and going to see Our Lady Of Guadalupe.

There are so many to thank. Joanne comes to mind. She is my spiritual twin in so many ways. You are a wonderful parish. You are growing, diverse and a parish, maybe the only one in an eucharistic church, that is without any fences. My time serving at Christ's altar with Bill and Dane has been richly rewarding. Sean's music is superb and his gentle heart a gift. Dan is without question the reason the building stands and Gordon is the reason Dan is always safe. He is the watch the ladder man. Jesse is a tremendous help at the altar and around the building. He is a postulant fully now. In 3 or 4 years he will be a priest. And Linda has been a faith filled leader; a priest cannot ask for anything more than that. The list could go on and on and I would miss someone and cause hurt feelings. I am ever grateful for all you have done for the community, for Cathy and myself and for God. Truly this parish takes seriously listening to the Spirit, being Kind and being the hands and feet of Christ in the world. For that I give deep thanks. It has been a joy and a privilege to serve you.
